Fresh from the Farm By Denny Rogers, SHF Board Treasurer The temperature is dropping, the leaves are almost gone and another growing season at Safe Haven Farms draws to a close. The harvest was bountiful from April through October, but things were definitely different this year due to COVID restrictions. Gone were the day participants and community volunteers

to help with the work of the garden. Gone, too, was the popular vegetable stand outside the Pendleton Art Center in downtown Middletown where vegetables were sold, and friendships were made.

Yet in spite of the unique challenges, our horticulture program continues to flourish and grow. Under the leadership of Mike Rogers, the on-site residents were able to continue to support the gardens. Instead of the weekly farm stand retail outlet, he started a very popular Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program. With the CSA, ten customers signed up for a full season of vegetables from the farm and received their overflowing box of vegetables from the harvest each week. One satisfied customer wrote *"All of the produce has been beautiful with a nice variety and it's been so much fun to see what comes in my box each week. Thank you so much for sharing the fruits of your labor!"*





Due to the increasing community interest in buying locally, the gardens of Safe Haven Farms are continuing to grow and provide more work opportunities for our farmers and expand our impact. We received grants in 2020 from the Middletown Community Foundation, the Butler Rural Electric Community Connection and a gift from an anonymous donor through the

Hamilton Community Foundation which has allowed us to convert our large pole barn into a vegetable processing space and farm store. Here we will be able to significantly increase our capacity for growing seedlings under grow lights in cold weather to get a head start on the outdoor growing season in our gardens and hoop houses. The building modifications are nearly complete and include a large heated and air-conditioned space for more seedling carts and planting tables, sinks for cleaning and processing vegetables after harvest, counter space for assembling weekly CSA orders, and a large cooler for storing vegetables

before they are sold. There is also a small farm store planned where the community can come to buy vegetables if they can't make it to the weekly vegetable stand in Middletown.

Our horticulture program meets a community need for locally grown produce and provides meaningful activities for our farm residents and day participants. But it would not be possible without the many individual and foundation donors who support our programs and

the community members who purchase our produce. We hope the COVID restrictions will be improved by next spring and with our increased capacity we will be able to expand our CSA program and resume our vegetable stand in Middletown in the spring of 2021.
