The dream of establishing a Therapeutic Riding Program at Safe Haven Farms moved one giant step closer to reality on Sept 15° as the women of Impact 100, a local philanthropic group, voted to award Safe Haven a grant of \$112,000.

Dave and Sue Wilson wrote the grant in record time, under the pressure of a looming deadline. Safe Haven was chosen as one of four finalists for (2) \$112,000 grants. As part of Impact 100's 10 year anniversary festivities, a banquet, including presentations by the finalists, was held at the Museum Center at Union Terminal. Denny Rogers

and Kathy Bolduc made the winning presentation. It was an exciting evening as votes were tabulated and winners announced over dessert. Stepping Stones Center won the second grant for a respite program geared toward children with severe behavioral challenges. An


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southwest Ohio," said Denny

"Everyone loves the iPads and each individual interacts at his or her own level and pace," said Mike Rogers, learning center coordinator. "One main thing I focus on is having them confident to communicate their needs either nonverbally or through talking."

Small groups rotate through the room, solving the giant floor puzzles, working

on the math applications, or surfing the web for favorite sites. On special days, a movie might be the main attraction or using the smart board to plan an upcoming holiday event. As the day program staff and farmers become more familiar with the technology at the Learning Center, the possibilities will also expand.

Other techy news

SHF President Denny Rogers has been following GPS technology for years and reports that a recent article in USA Today noted that the Federal Communication Commission has approved shoes embedded with tracking devices that could be used for persons with developmental disabilities or Alzheimer disease. The shoes retail for approximately \$299 and information about the manufacturer can be found online by googling "GPS shoe." With the advent of smart phones, it may be possible to download an app and track the shoe wearer through an iPad or other similar device, noted Denny, who added that you could set up a virtual fence area and get an alert when the person leaves this safety zone.

If you ask nicely, maybe she will save you a dance at an upcoming Safe Haven dance!








