

Work on the Farm in the Time of COVID-19 By Pam Lockwood

The world has been a pretty crazy place lately, but I wanted to report on life at Safe Haven Farms in the midst of the pandemic. The day services program was closed to community participants in mid-March. Day and residential staff and our farmers, as we like to call them, prepared to hunker down and ride out the virus. Things were a little challenging initially when toilet paper was hard to find and everyone was buying out the stores. The staff did a heroic job hunting down supplies and that has sorted itself out largely with some additional help from the county board of DD.

There was a recent scare with a resident getting tested for the virus, but that turned out negative and everyone breathed a huge sigh of relief. Yet we realized it is going to be a long journey to get through this, and other scares might occur. Amazingly, though, our folks have done beautifully. You may know that our residents thrive on structure and some of us worried that the stay at home order would change everything. But Choices in Community Living staff were resilient and creative and put in place a plan to meet the requirements of the order, yet keep our folks busy and structured.

I had an opportunity to visit the farm briefly in early April to take some supplies. I saw a beautiful, green landscape which was peaceful and organized. Small groups of farmers have been taking care of the animals, planting and watering the gardens, creating crafts in the Hatton Center, taking walks around the farm and visiting nearby parks. The staff was very positive and remarked how blessed we are in this chaotic time to have place of beauty and calm for our farmers, most of whom do not even understand what is going on in the world outside.

Horticulture is in full swing with expanded numbers of beds and planting underway. I saw onions, spinach, beets, strawberries and too many other vegetables to count. There is an expanded melon garden and a new shade garden. The snap peas will be amazing and we will have purple potatoes. The alpacas, horses, chickens—some new babies—and ducks are doing well. Fields are green and fences are being repaired.

In this uncertain time we are more committed than ever to having a vibrant, active farm life for our children and others from the community when they can return. We will start up our equestrian program again, work on our Community Supported Agriculture plan, have vegetables for the community and residents, and continue to weather the storm.

Thanks to everyone who helps to make this dream come true on the 10th anniversary of the opening of Safe Haven Farms. We appreciate the support and love you share with us.

Planting is proceeding with the hope that this season will provide sufficient bounty for a new venture. Won't you please help us with this project?

We have been planning to start a **Community Supported Agriculture** program. A **CSA** is a subscription program

Over the years the farmers have learned to plant seeds, transplant seedlings, water and nurture young plants, and harvest ready to pick produce.

The next step is for the farmers to learn how to assemble containers of fresh produce for the CSA subscribers. A pilot program this summer will launch this effort and we could use your donation.

We need to purchase supplies for our hydroponic greenhouse, a stainless steel sink, vegetable sorting tables, an upgraded



HVAC for our horticulture barn, and new water lines for washing produce. To keep the freshly picked and packed produce fresh, we will need to buy a commercial refrigeration unit.
